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Crochet Pattern

Skill level: Intermediate

About this pattern

I use USA terminology for my pattern (don't worry if you use UK terms, all the differences are explained in the pattern).

Abbreviations

ch = chaininc = increase (2 sc in 1 st)dec = decrease (sc2tog) $sc_{2}tog = single crochet two$ stitches together rnd = roundst(s) = stitch(es)sl st = slip stitchsc = single crochethdc = half double crochet hdc inc = 2 hdc in one stitch dc = double crochetdouble dec $(sc_3tog) = single$ crochet three stitches together (xx) – count of stitches in this row/round tyw – turn your work

Finished size Approx. 20 x 21 cm (7.7" x 8.2")

Materials and Tools

You will need:

- ✓ Yarn Sport / 5 ply (12 wpi) (125 yards (115 meters) per 50 g skein) 30 g of main color yarn (gray in my case) for body,
 - 7 g of yarn darker than the main color (dark gray) for outlines 7 g of red for comb
 - 8 g of white for apron
 - 3 g of orange for beak and legs
 - 3 g of green for leaves
 - Some black if you want to embroider eyes.
- ✓ Two plastic eyes (Ø 8 x 16 mm) or use felt and glue.
- ✓ Flower button about 25 mm or crochet it (instructions are given)
- ✓ Hook 2 mm (US Steel hook 4, UK 14).
- ✓ Sewing needle
- ✓ Transparent glue

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When making this project, you should use a much smaller hook than recommended for the yarn you choose.

Tip (stitches)

If you are a beginner crocheter you can see "Appendix" at the end of the pattern for reference how to crochet a particular stitch.

Tip (abbreviations)

If there is a record in the brackets in the pattern, multiplied by some number, for example (3 sc, 1 inc) x 3, it means you need to repeat this action 3 times, that is 3 sc, 1 inc, 3 sc, 1 inc, 3 sc, 1 inc.



Tip (make it right)

If there are no special notes, the bookmark is crocheted under both loops. In some rows, there are special notes: 'into the front loop only' or 'into the back loop only'. In this case, you need to follow those instructions.

Projects with intricate stitch patterns, techniques and dimension, such as non-repeating patterns, multicolor techniques, fine threads, small hooks, detailed shaping and refined finishing.



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Tip (make it right)

If there are no special notes, the project is crocheted under both parts of the loop.



How to read this pattern

If you see **Rnd 2:** (inc) x 6 [12 sts], sl st, ch 1, tyw Read it like this:

In second round work 2 single crochet in next st, repeat this instruction 6 times, make sure you have crocheted 12 stitches in this round, 1 slip stitch in first stitch of this round to join, chain 1 and turn your work.

[8 sts] – number in brackets is the count of stitches in a round.

Note: sl st, ch 1 at the end of a row/round are not counted as stitches for the final count of stitches in a row/round.

Base of the chicken

Work in rows with main color yarn (light gray in my case). <u>Turn your work after each row</u>.

Tip: When you see ch 1, ch 2 or ch 3, etc., at the end of the row, start the next row beginning from 2^{nd} st from the hook. It is made to increase the number of sts.

To begin: ch 13, start from 2nd ch from hook and

work:

Row 1: 11 sc, inc [13 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 2:** 13 sc, inc [15 sts.], 4 ch, tyw **Row 3:** 17 sc, inc [19 sts.], 3 ch, tyw **Row 4:** 19 sc, inc [19 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 5:** 17 sc, inc [19 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 6:** 24 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row** 7: 26 sc, inc [28 sts.], 3 ch, tyw **Row 8:** 29 sc, inc [31 sts.], 4 ch, tyw **Row 9:** 33 sc, inc [35 sts.], 3 ch, tyw Row 10: 33 sc, inc [38 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 11:** 38 sc, inc [40 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 12:** 40 sc, 2 ch, tyw Row 13: 42 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 14:** 40 sc, inc [42 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 15:** 42 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 16:** 44 sc, inc [46 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 17: 46 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 18:** 43 sc, inc [45 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 19-24:** 48 sc, 1 ch, tyw **Row 25:** skip 1 st, dec, 34 sc, sc3tog [36 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 26:** dec, 30 sc, sc3tog [32 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 27:** skip 1 st, dec, 26 sc, sc3tog [28 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 28:** skip 1 st, dec, 29 sc, sc3tog [27 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 29:** dec, 21 sc, dec [19 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 30: 22 sc, 1 ch, tyw Row 31: dec, 18 sc, dec [20 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 32-34: 20 sc, 1 ch, tyw Row 35: dec, 16 sc, dec [18 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 36-41: 18 sc, 1 ch, tyw **Row 42:** dec, 14 sc, dec [16 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 43:** 16 sc, 1 ch, tyw

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Row 44: dec, 12 sc, dec [14 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 45: 14 sc, 1 ch, tyw Row 46: dec, 15 sc, dec [17 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 47: dec, 8 sc, dec [10 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 48: skip 1 st, dec, 4 sc, sc3tog [6 sts.], 1 ch, tyw. Work sc around whole base. Fasten off and weave in loose ends.

Comb

Take a piece of contrasting yarn and attach it to the center of the top part of the base.

Take red yarn, leave about 5 meters (5.5 yards) and attach yarn to the 13th stitch to the right of contrasting yarn. Left over yarn will be needed to work around the comb.



Row 1: work 18 sc starting from the stitch you attached the yarn to, ch 1, tyw



Row 2: (5 sc, inc) x 3 [20 sts.], ch 1, tyw Row 3: dec, 16 sc [17 sts.], ch 1, tyw Row 4: 5 sc, inc, 3 sc, 2 dec [17 sts.], ch 1, tyw Row 5: dec, 15 sc [16 sts.], ch 1, tyw Row 6: dec, 9 sc [10 sc), ch 1, tyw Row 7: dec, 6 sc, dec [8 sts.].

Fasten off.

Using left over yarn work sc around the comb. Then work Crab stitch.

Tip: If you do not know how to work Crab stitch, see "Appendix" for reference.

While working Crab stitch make a loop at the top of the comb: ch 18, 1 sl st to join with comb.



Body outline

Take yarn, which is darker than the yarn for the body (I use dark gray).

Tip: If you do not know how to work Surface Slip Stitch, see "Appendix" for reference.

TIP: You can thread sewing needle with contrasting thread and make running stitches of how the curved crochet line should go on the body before starting crocheting Surface Slip Stich. Remove thread when you are done with crocheting.





When you get to the end of the wing start crocheting sc along the bottom part of the body until you reach second wing.



Start working Surface Slip stitch on the other side of the Body.



Fasten off and weave in loose ends.

Head and wings outline

Take yarn that is darker than the yarn for the body (I use dark gray).

Attach it close to the left side of the comb (see photo for reference) and start working sc until you reach the tip of the wing.



Make 5 "fans" along the rounded part of the wing (they are 5 dc in one st) but before starting crocheting them, take 5 pieces of contrasting yarn and divide wing to 5 parts.

First "fan" should be made out of first stitch of the rounder part of the wing. Distance between other "fans" is 3-4 stitches.

Work long (spike) sc between "fans" by putting hook not under the sc but 10-12 mm lower (to imitate feathers).



Finish 5th "fan" with sl st, fasten off and weave in loose ends.



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Work "fans" on second wing the same way.

Hips

First hip.

Take piece of contrasting yarn and attach it to the middle of bottom part.

Attach main color yarn to the 7th stitch to the right of the contrasting yarn.

Ch 2, 1 dc in same stitch you started to work chains from, 2 dc in next stitch, dc, 2 dc in next st, dc, ch 2, sl st in the same st you worked last dc from. Fasten off.



Second hip.

Attach main color yarn to the 3rd stitch to the left of the contrasting yarn.

Ch 2, 1 dc in same stitch you started to work chains from, 2 dc in next stitch, dc, 2 dc in next st, dc, ch 2, sl st in the same st you worked last dc from. Fasten off.

Legs (make 2)

Take yarn for legs (I use orange) and ch 12 *First finger* Start from 3rd ch from hook and work: dc, hdc, sc, sl st, ch 6. *Second finger*

Start from 3^{rd} ch from hook and work: dc, hdc, sc, sl st, ch 6.

Third finger

Start from 3rd ch from hook and work: dc, hdc, sc, sl st.

Join all fingers by working sl st in 6th ch of first 12 chains, 5 sc.



Fasten off leaving a long tail for sewing. Sew legs to the back side of hips.

Apron

Take yarn for apron (I use white).

To begin ch 11, start from 2nd ch from hook: **Row 1:** 9 sc, inc [11 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 2:** 11 sc, inc [13 sts.], 3 ch, tyw **Row 3:** 14 sc, inc [16 sts.], 2 ch, tyw **Row 4:** 16 sc, inc [18 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 5:** 18 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 6:** 18 sc, inc [20 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 7:** 20 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 8:** 20 sc, inc [22 sts.], 1 ch, tyw **Row 9-15:** 22 sc, 1 ch, tyw **Row 16:** 22 sc, 1 ch.

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Do not fasten off. Work 44 sc along the rounded edge, turn your work. <u>You need exactly 44 sc!</u>

Work «fans» along rounded edge: (skip 1 stitch, 5 dc in next stitch, skip 1, sl st) x 11 Fasten off leaving a long tail.

Leaves (make 2)

Work with green color yarn. To begin ch 6, start from 2nd ch from hook: *Leaf 1* – sl st, 1 sc, 2 hdc, sl st, ch 6. *Leaf 2* – start from 2nd ch from hook and work: sl st, 1 sc, 2 hdc, sl st, ch 6. *Leaf 3* – start from 2nd ch from hook and work: sl st, 1 sc, 2 hdc, sl st. Fasten off leaving a long tail for sewing. Sew leaves to the apron then sew apron to the body. See picture for reference. Do not sew along the top of apron.

Beak

Work with orange color yarn.

To begin ch 3, start from 2nd ch from hook: **Row 1:** 2 sc, 2 ch, tyw **Row 2:** 2 sc, inc [4 sts.], 2 ch, tyw

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Row 3: 4 sc, inc [6 sts.], 2 ch, tyw Row 4: 6 sc, inc [8 sts.], 1 ch, tyw Row 5: 8 sc.

Work sc around the whole part. Fasten off leaving a long tail for sewing.



Sew beak to the head.

Iron chicken a little bit.

Glue eyes to the head.

You can also embroider eyes or make them out of felt and glue to the head.

Sew flower button on top of leaves or crochet a flower.

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Appendix 2


STITCHES USED IN THE PATTERN

Slip knot


Loop the yarn around your left index finger.



Slip the yarn from your finger, and hold the loop between your thumb and index finger.




Use the crochet hook, held in your right hand, to draw the loop up and around the hook.



Chain


Start with slip knot, yarn over, pull the strand of yarn though the loop on your hook – you've got one chain.



Continue to repeat the process to create more chains.


Slip Stitch

Insert the hook in the next chain, yarn over and pull the strand of yarn through the chain and the loop on the hook.



Single Crochet

Insert the hook in the chain, yarn over, pull the strand of yarn through the chain, yarn over again and pull the strand of yarn through both loops on the hook. Starting from round 2 insert the hook in the stitch of previous round.



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Decrease

In the place where you need decrease pull up a loop in next 2 stitches of previous round, yarn over, pull the strand of yarn through all 3 loops on the hook, counts as one single crochet.




Increase

In the beginning (end or middle) of the row make 2 single crochets in 1 stitch of previous round.




Half double crochet (hdc)

Yarn over, insert the hook in the chain or in the stitch of previous round and pull the yarn through. Yarn over again and gently pull the wrapped hook through the center of all 3 loops on your hook.




Double crochet (dc)

Yarn over, insert the hook in the chain or in the stitch of previous round and pull the yarn through.




Yarn over again and gently pull the wrapped hook through the center of the first 2 loops on your hook, yarn over again and draw your yarn through the last 2 loops on the hook.



Fasten Off Yarn

When you get to the end of your crochet design and you'll need to fasten off the yarn. Fastening off crochet is a fancy way to say "cut the yarn and secure it."

1. Cut the yarn about 15 cm (6 inches) from the hook then using your hook, draw the cut end of the yarn through the last remaining loop on your hook.



2. Pull gently on the tail of yarn to snug up the

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
end.

This action keeps your work from coming apart without having to make large unsightly knots.

Surface Slip Stitch (SSS)

Step 1: Hold the yarn on the wrong side of the work; insert hook through the stitches; yarn over and pull yarn to the right side.

Step 2: insert hook through the stitches again few mm from the previous stich, yarn over on the back side and pull yarn through the fabric to the right side and then through the loop on the hook. Repeat step 2 as many times as needed.

Weaving in ends

When the work is completed it is necessary to weave in all ends.

1. Thread one end through a tapestry needle

2. Weave the 15 cm (6 inches) tail of yarn up and down through 3 or 4 stitches — kind of in a zigzag pattern (try not to split the yarn of the stitches).

3. To make the end really secure go back the way you came, weaving the end backwards through those same few stitches.

4. Cut the yarn about 0.5 cm (1/4 inch) from the

fabric and gently pull the fabric. The end magically disappears, and your work is secure.

Double decreasing (sc3tog)

Step 1: Pull up loops from next 3 stitches of the row.



Step 2: Yarn over, pull the strand of yarn through 2 loops on the hook. You should end up with three loops on the hook.



Step 3: Yarn over again and pull the strand of yarn through 3 loops on the hook.



We get 1 sc out of three stitches.

Changing colors

When you change colors, the last sc of one color has to be finished with the thread of the other

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
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color.



Put free thread along the edge of the last row to hide the end so it is crocheted inside the fabric. The fabric will be double-sided – it will look almost the same at the right side and at the back side.

Make sure that the thread inside the fabric does not tighten it.




Crab stitch (Reverse Single Crochet Stitch)

Crab stitch is the most popular way to finish the edge. For this stitch single crochets are worked not from right to left as usual but from left to right.

 Finish crocheting and with the loop on the hook do not turn, insert the hook in next stitch to the right moving the hook away from you as the arrow shows.




2. Yarn over, draw yarn through stitch as the arrow shows.




3. Yarn over, draw yarn through two loops on the hook as the arrow shows.



4. 1 crab stitch is made, the loop is on the hook.



5. Repeat step 2.



6. Continue till the end of the edge.
